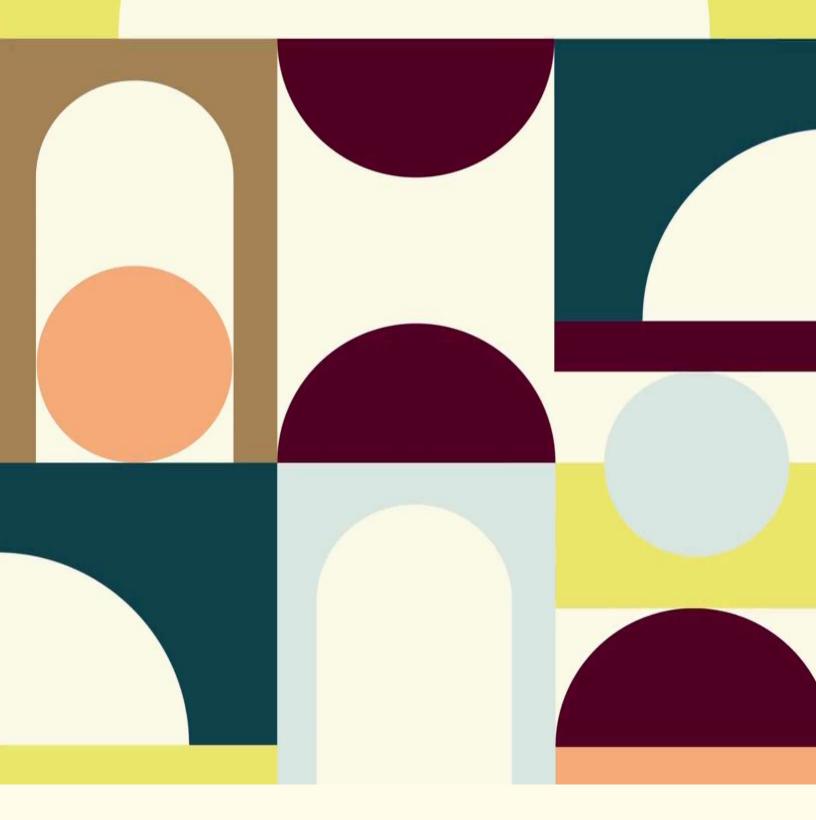

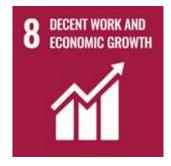

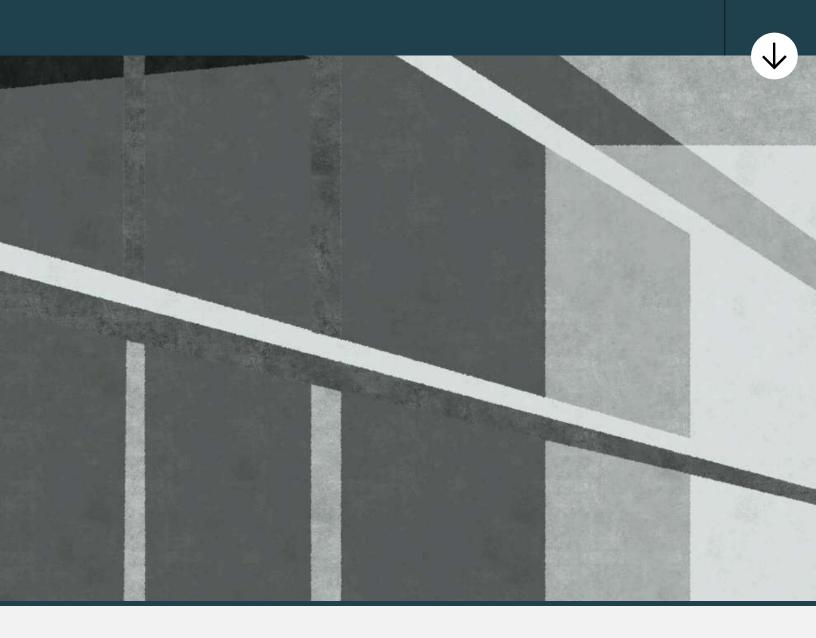

#### **ICAWOOD**

#### CREATING THE NEIGHBOURHOODS OF THE FUTURE

Revitalizing neighbourhoods and creating unifying spaces where occupants can live, work and play is one of the missions we gave ourselves. In Paris, the project that will be built on rue des Poissonniers is the brainchild of the ICAWOOD fund and the ChartierDalix architecture firm.

#### MORE THAN JUST BUILDINGS

Michael Neuman, Vice President, Investments, Europe, explained that the ICAWOOD fund was set up to fulfill three goals: to build offices made of low-carbon wood, to develop the Greater Paris area and to create value. "We don't want to develop just for the sake of building new spaces; we want to set ourselves apart with our products and create true value over the long term".

ICAWOOD was born from a partnership between Ivanhoé Cambridge; ICAMAP, an investment fund management company specializing in real estate, whose president is Guillaume Poitrinal; and WO2, co-founded by Philippe Zivkovic. This partnership allows us to invest in highly technical and complex project; moreover, it gives us the opportunity to use cross-laminated

timber (CLT), a very low-carbon material developed by WO2.



#### A FIRST PROJECT

Taking the form of a mixed-used building consisting of offices, student housing, retail businesses and restaurants, a brand-new project will be developed in the heart of the 18<sup>th</sup> arrondissement on rue des Poissonniers. It's an exemplary project on the environmental front, says Philippe Zivkovic: In addition to being built with CLT, it will be erected on an existing concrete structure. Once it's been reduced in size and transformed, the skeleton will serve as the foundation for a building that will further open onto the outdoors.



"The city is being built on itself," said Frédéric Chartier, architect and cofounder of ChartierDalix. "The rue des Poissonniers project, which embodies what could very well be the office of the future, is being superimposed on a site that already has a history." The architect and his team are planning an all-wood structure on top of the concrete; it's a lightweight option that preserves the existing buildings and is environmentally friendly.

On the roof, an urban rooftop farm creates added ecological value. Large offices with giant windows offering views of the street will allow workers and retailers to feel continuously connected to the community and to passersby.

#### A VIBRANT NEIGHBOURHOOD

\_ Deep Ellum, Dallas

In partnership with Hines and Westdale, we have acquired a parcel of land in Dallas at 2700 Commerce Street in the booming Deep Ellum district. We will be developing a mixed-use building consisting of highend boutiques and hyper-modern offices. The project will help position Deep Ellum as one of the city's neighbourhoods of tomorrow.





\_ Demain Montréal, a winner of the Reinventing Cities competition

The project by the Demain Montréal team—represented by Cogir, Ivanhoé Cambridge and Pomerleau—was selected as one of the winners of Reinventing Cities. This worldwide competition aims to support low-carbon initiatives and is organized by C40, an organization committed to fighting climate change.

Our plan is to create a unique low-carbon emission neighbourhood, an inclusive and unifying space with affordable housing and zero-waste grocery stores and restaurants close to workers and residents—all of it powered by smart technology. This project allows us to position ourselves as a player in the carbon-neutral construction industry and marks one of the first steps in creating a neighbourhood and a community within Montreal's Cité du Multimédia.



#### A SUSTAINABLE INNOVATION HUB

\_ T3 RiNo, Denver

In partnership with McCaffery and Hines, we have broken ground in the River North Art District (RiNo) on the T3 RiNo project, a six-storey timber office complex that will be one of the most sustainable and environmentally friendly buildings in Denver.

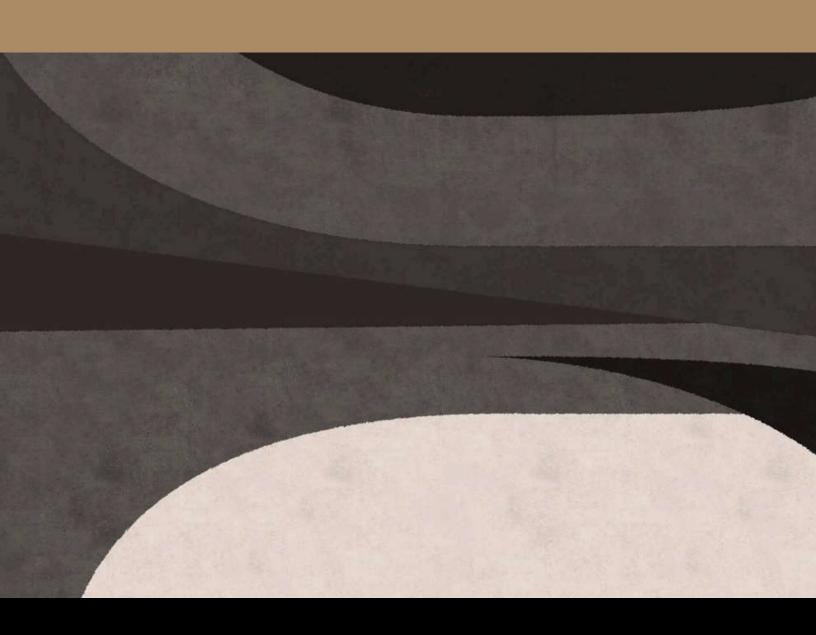

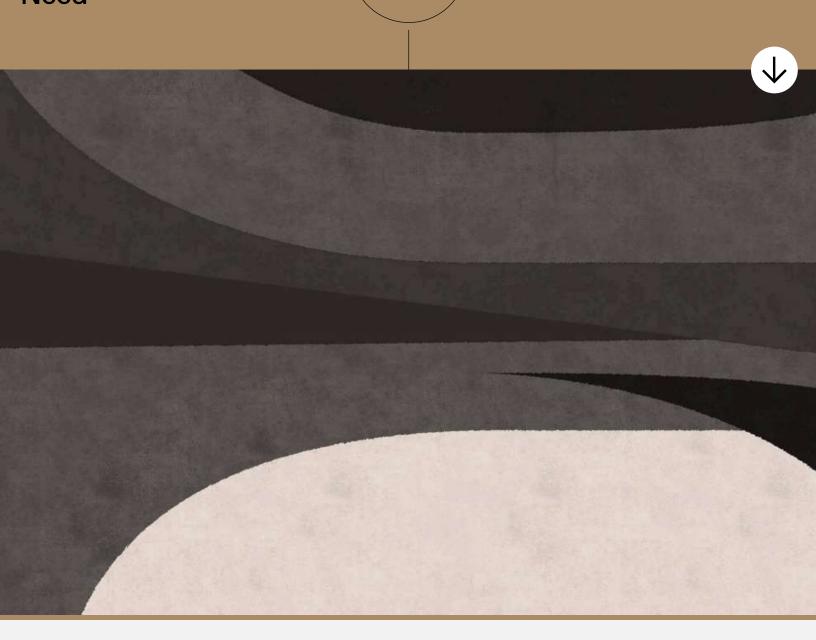

### TIME OUT MARKET

#### TIME OUT MARKET'S REIMAGINED CULINARY EXPERIENCE

The opening of Time Out Market at Centre Eaton de Montréal marked a turning point for the city's gourmet landscape. With its unique culinary offering by some of Montréal's greatest chefs—gathered under one roof—this new concept has quickly become a downtown staple.

#### A WARM WELCOME

According to Johanne Marcotte, Vice President, Operations, Retail, the table was set for Montreal to welcome this internationally renowned concept. "With the Centre Eaton de Montréal, we had an exceptional location. We were looking for a centrepiece and it was love at first sight between us and the Time Out Market team."

Montrealers and visitors to the city also fell head over heels for the concept. The moment Time Out opened in November 2019, there was an immediate response: The public showed up in droves to taste dishes by chefs such as Normand Laprise, Paul Toussaint and Charles-Antoine Crête. The Time Out team has always been very active on social media and the widespread enthusiasm was obvious. This excitement and the culinary experience provided by the restaurant owners only added to the already diverse offering at the Centre Eaton de Montréal. It also created

synergy with the new Decathlon store as well as flagship retailers, such as the recently expanded and renovated Sephora.



#### A UNIQUE BUSINESS MODEL

Before launching its culinary destinations, Time Out Market made its name worldwide with its Time Out food and culture magazines. Johanne Marcotte says the brand's high profile and reach benefitted Time Out Market Montreal, enabling to attract the chefs who oversee its 16 food stalls and adding cachet to its launch.



#### LOCAL FLAVOURS

Time Out Market's other major strength is its ability to lend a local touch to each of its destinations. To meet the needs of its Montreal clientele, which Johanne Marcotte describes as "discerning, diverse and plugged in," Time Out Market offers brunch on weekends and a selection of Quebec products in its boutique, Signé Local.

For chef Paul Toussaint, the Montreal touch finds expression in his Haitian and Caribbean cuisine, which he has adapted slightly for local tastes by tweaking the flavours and spices. As for the spirit of Time Out Market, Toussaint likens it to a big family: "There's no competition here. The chefs help one another out and aren't afraid to ask for a hand. We've created a true sense of community."

#### **CATHCART**

#### CATHCART, THE NEW OASIS OF PVM

Opened in January 2020 after five years of planning and hard work, Cathcart Restaurants et Biergarten marries fine dining with culture under PVM's impressive glass pavilion.



#### CREATING A GATHERING PLACE

#### CONNECTING WITH THE OUTDOORS

Jean Pelland, Architect and Senior Partner at Sid Lee Architecture, and his team developed this project with the intention of bringing the outside in. Their unique design has created dynamic, open and accessible spaces that form a spectacular environment.

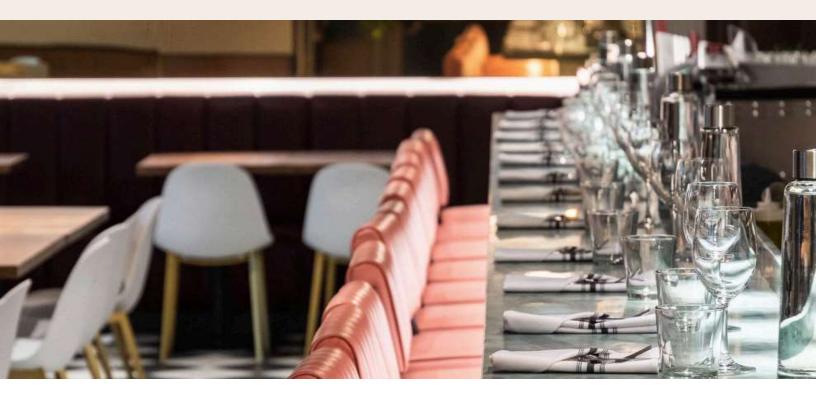
Turning this underground area into a four-season indoor garden was no mean feat for Sid Lee Architecture. To create a gathering space and a connection to the outdoors, the team of architects had an ambitious idea: to remove the roof and replace it with a vast glass pavilion. The structure may appear simple at first glance, but it is in fact highly complex and required considerable ingenuity. Moreover, the pavilion's 18 glass panels had to be brought over by boat from Germany.



#### OFFERING SEAMLESS SERVICE

Operations management for Cathcart Restaurants et Biergarten is handled by the Montreal company A5 Hospitality, which creates and runs restaurants and bars, including Kampai Brasserie Asiatique and Jatoba. A5 Hospitality faced a significant challenge: The restaurateurs invited to join the group tended to run traditional establishments and weren't

accustomed to the culinary-destination model. For A5 Hospitality founder Alexandre Besnard and his team, the solution was to centralize everything, from management to order placement. With this single-interface approach, all the restaurants can offer food and service that meet a uniformly high standard of quality.



#### PROPERTIES CENTRED ON USER NEEDS

\_ Gran Ciudad, Mexico City

In 2019, we formed a new partnership with Gran Ciudad Group and the Mexican pension fund AFORE Citibanamex, in which Ivanhoé Cambridge owns 60% of the equity.

The goal of the partnership, along with the multiresidential property development and management group, is to build a scalable portfolio of institutional-quality residential rental properties in Mexico's main markets.



"This investment stems from our conviction that the rental market for institutional-quality multiresidential properties, which is underserved in Mexico, has tremendous appeal. Our longterm vision of Mexico's demographic trends is positive."

\_ Decathlon

Decathlon opened a store in downtown Montreal in the fall of 2019.



It chose the Centre Eaton de Montréal as the location for the first Decathlon outlet in a city centre in Canada. It's also the first Decathlon store in Montreal.

Decathlon's unique selection of lowcost sportswear and sports equipment allows us to compete with other major retailers.

#### HOTELS FOR ALL

#### \_ easyHotel

In partnership with the real estate fund manager ICAMAP, we acquired 68.8% of the share capital of easyHotel, a chain concentrated in the super-budget segment. With a network of properties located primarily in city centres, and spaces that are flexible and versatile, easyHotel ties in to our plan to offer best-value vacation options across Europe.

Thanks to major investments that have enabled easyHotel to accelerate its deployment in continental Europe, the company will be able to fulfill its potential and become a European leader in the affordable-hotel industry.





#### MADE-TO-MEASURE WORKSPACES

#### \_ Golden Capital, Berlin

We have acquired a strategic stake in Golden Capital, a Berlin company that concentrates on manage-to-core office investments. This investment will allow us to manage and purchase buildings focused on user needs.

Golden Capital owns and manages one of the largest and most diversified private commercial real estate portfolios in Germany. Its 39 properties are mainly office buildings in the country's seven largest cities.

#### BRINGING EMPLOYERS

Partnering with the job-search startup Wirkn helps Ivanhoé Cambridge connect retailers at Bayshore Shopping Centre in Ottawa with qualified candidates.

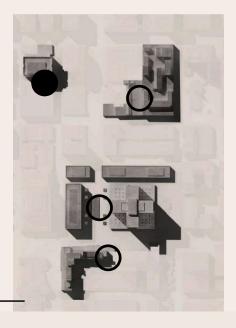

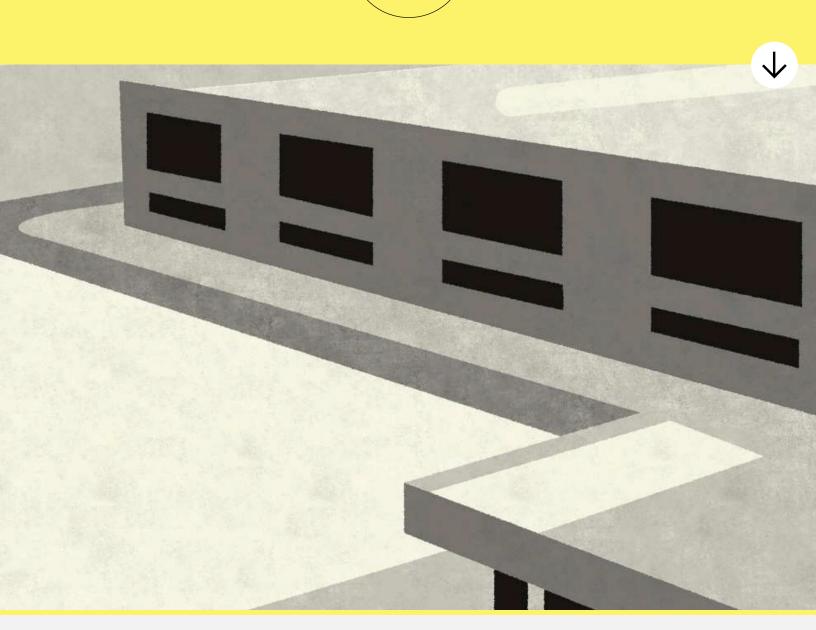

### A FEAT OF LOGISTICS

## JOINING FORCES WITH PROLOGIS TO SERVE THE BRAZILIAN MARKET

In early 2019, we signed a deal with Prologis, Inc., the global leader in logistics real estate. This joint venture, created to develop and operate logistics properties in Brazil, currently has five logistics parks in São Paulo and three in Rio de Janeiro. By the end of 2020, its operating properties are expected to have gross leasable area of 800,000 square metres; in addition, it has a large land bank for future development.

This initial US\$880-million investment is part of our strategy of focusing on industrial and logistics assets in cities with rapidly growing e-commerce markets. And it's clear that Brazil has the wind in its sails in this respect. "Brazil currently has some of the strongest logistics real estate customer demand in the world," says Gene Reilly, Prologis' Chief Investment Officer (and formerly the company's CEO of the Americas). "This demand has been driven primarily by the consumer products segment, specifically the e-commerce sales channel. We provide the type of product these customers want: strategically located facilities built to international design and construction standards."



#### E-COMMERCE AND MUCH MORE

Having a local presence — as we have since 2017, when we opened our office in São Paulo - allows us to adapt our offering to the needs of the local economy and communities. Making the most of this approach by joining forces with Prologis simply made sense; it's a world class partner with the same values as ours. "This partnership also enables us to develop synergies and relationships between Prologis and our retail platform Ancar Ivanhoé, because their customer bases are similar," said Adriano Mantesso, Managing Director, Latin America. "Working together allows us to serve our customers more effectively, which give us a competitive edge."

Having large retail distribution centres focused on getting products to stores or to smaller intermediate centres has But, as always, sustainability on multiple fronts remains a priority. For example, our modern facilities have larger truck staging areas and higher ceilings for maximum storage, as well as natural lighting and efficient ventilation, which contribute to healthy conditions for employees. We want to provide a safe and healthy workplace, while working more effectively and intelligently for our customers.

allowed us to better serve Brazil's urban population, as has the advent of e-commerce giant Amazon, which opened its first direct fulfillment centre in South America at our Cajamar facility in the São Paulo market.



#### RENTERS' PARADISE

\_ Greenford Quay, London

Greater London has had a housing shortage for a number of years, and the Greenford area of West London is no exception. In partnership with Greystar, Ivanhoé Cambridge will develop a large-scale mixed project in Greenford over the next few years, providing more than 2,000 housing units on a former industrial site. It's a perfect fit with our vision of the "Neighbourhoods of Tomorrow."

The Greenford Quay project is 30 minutes from downtown by public transit and covers more than 20 acres, crossed by a canal. It won't be just a residential development; it will also include a grocery store, a café, a restaurant, workspaces, a school, and health and fitness centres. The vast majority of the housing will be rental units, including more than 400 at below-market rents, under an affordable housing program negotiated with the city.

#### MAJOR ACQUISITION BY PIRET

\_ 18103 Trans-Canada Highway

Amid high demand for Montreal's industrial spaces, Pure Industrial Real Estate Trust (PIRET)—which we coown with Blackstone—acquired an 11-property industrial portfolio from Healthcare of Ontario Pension Plan (HOOPP). The properties, comprising 1.5 million square feet, include warehouses, logistics buildings and distribution centres, all within the Greater Montreal Area.





#### FUTURE OPERATIONS

\_ Logistics projects across England

In partnership with PLP, we have expanded our logistics portfolio in England through the acquisition of superior-quality development projects in Leeds, Sheffield, Crewe and Knowsley. These projects, slated for delivery in 2020 and 2021, will allow Ivanhoé Cambridge and PLP to develop more than 2.6 million square feet of logistics space on 130 acres. The four projects are in prime logistics markets with excellent transport connections that will help us maximize performance.

#### SERVING SOUTHERN INDIA

\_ Logistics parks in Chennai, India

One of the world's fastest-growing economies has a new player: the Ivanhoé Cambridge partner LOGOS made its first acquisitions in India, after launching its operations in the country. Together, Mappedu Logistics Park and Mahindra World City comprise 2.2 million square feet of quality logistics facilities.

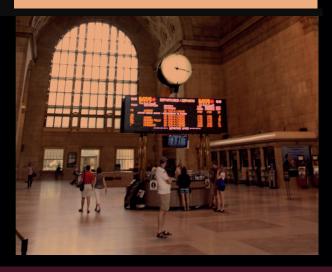

I expect to shave 40 minutes off that by arriving at the UP Express terminal at Union Station and walking directly into CIBC SQUARE rather than hopping on the subway. Instead of rushing around the way I do now, I'll have a bit more breathing room. I'll be saving money and gaining time, which I'll use to cook for my family and take my daughters to their after-school activities."







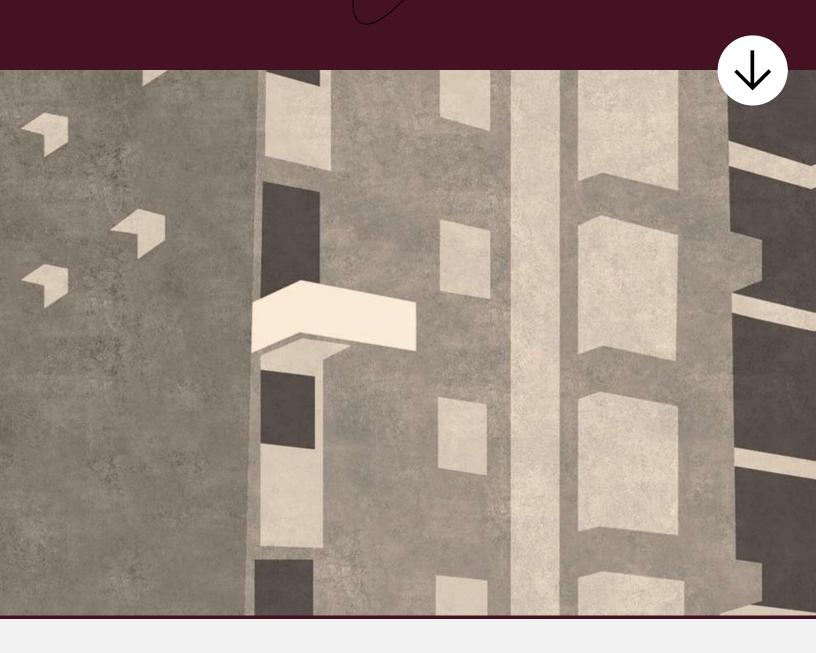

"The quicker you can get to your data, the better you can understand where the risks are. It helps you dominate the market."



#### FOCUSED ON THE FUTURE

We used to sift through hundreds of brokerage reports at the beginning of each month, but now we just log in. We can see who brings us tenants, where the tenants come from, the fields they work in and how our buildings are perceived in the marketplace. This transparency lets us manage our assets more effectively.

There's another distinct advantage, according to Pearce: "Tenants view owners who are constantly innovating and adopting new technologies as visionaries."

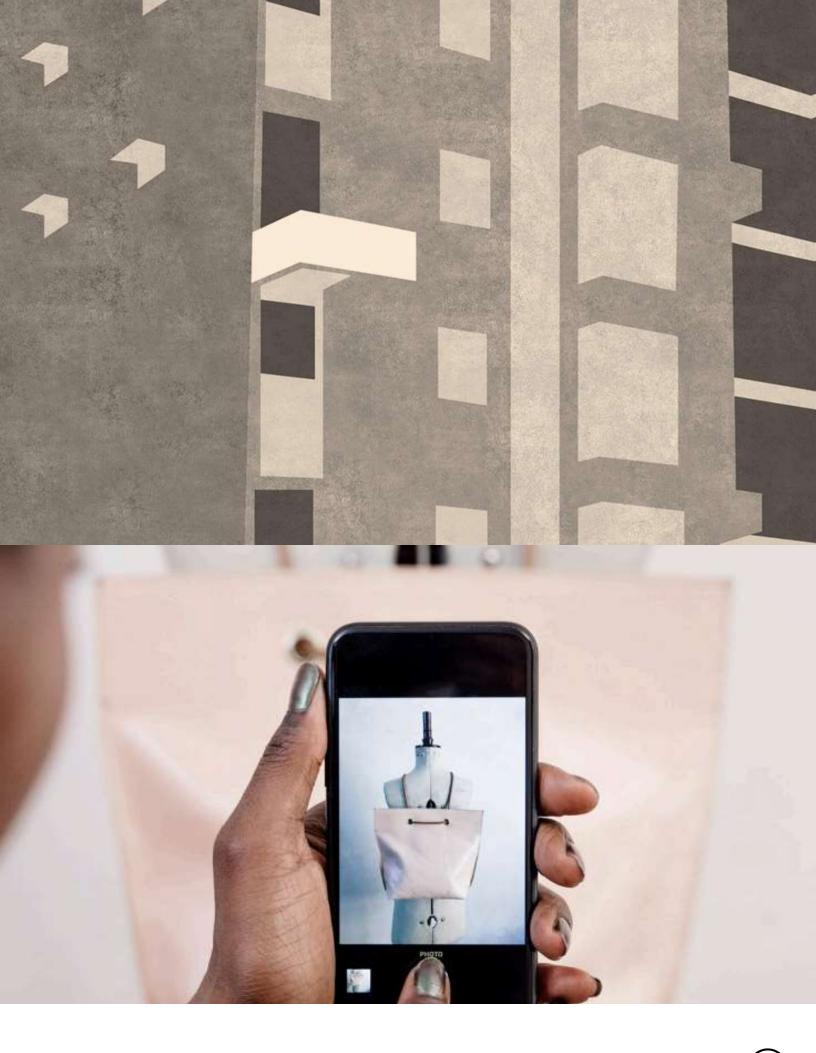

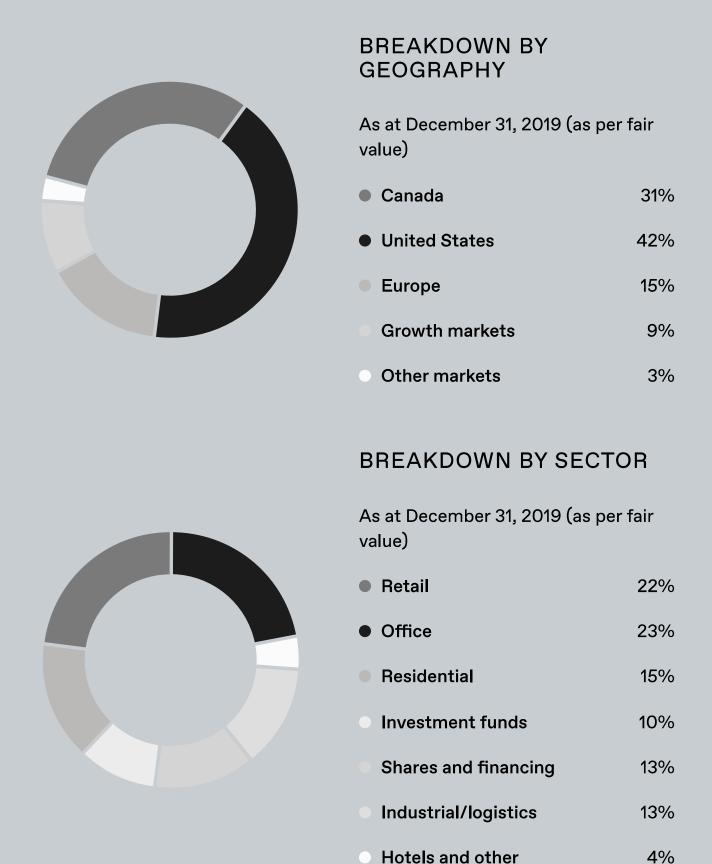

As Chief Financial and Business Performance Officer Simon Lauzier explained, "This initiative is perfectly aligned with our CSR vision and our desire to find innovative ways to finance our activities in a sustainable way for generations to come."

## BOARD OF DIRECTORS AND COMMITTEES

Our Board of Directors is made up of a majority of independent directors and is chaired by Macky Tall, Head of Real Assets and Private Equity, CDPQ, President and Chief Executive Officer, CDPQ Infra. The Board's role is to oversee our management and operations and to approve strategic planning.

The Board delegates select powers to four committees: the Investment Committee, the Human Resources and Compensation Committee, the Governance and Ethic Committee, and the Audit Committee. Each committee is chaired by an independent Board member.

## INTEGRATED RISK MANAGEMENT

Our team ensures that our inherent business risks are adequately managed, including having a reasonable resilience level towards enterprise risks such as environmental, social and governance (ESG). For prevention and protection of challenges and business opportunities, the team collaborates with our main shareholder, the Caisse de dépôt et placement du Québec (CDPQ).

#### INTERNAL AUDIT

Our Internal Audit team provides an impartial, independent evaluation of our risk management, control and governance processes and puts forward proposals to further strengthen existing efforts.

Our Code of Business Conduct lays out the guidelines for our dealings and operations. It addresses such issues as interpersonal relationships, conflicts of interest and asset protection.

# DISCRIMINATION, HARASSMENT AND VIOLENCE IN THE WORKPLACE

We strive to provide a healthy work environment where employees are empowered to reach their full potential. We are therefore committed to a culture that is free of discrimination, harassment and violence in any form.

#### ANTI-CORRUPTION

Our anti-corruption policy outlines our zero-tolerance stance on all forms of corrupt behaviour from our employees, officers and directors, as well as any third parties with whom we have dealings.

#### ETHICS HOTLINE

Violations of the Company's Code of Business Conduct or any other applicable policy or law can be reported confidentially through the ethics hotline.

#### **CSR GOVERNANCE**

Our CSR group - reporting to the Chief Investment and Innovation Officer – oversees the integration of environmental, social and governance aspects in the investment process across business units and corporate services. This includes the

implementation of the CSR strategy and action plan, reporting and stakeholder engagement. A working group is tasked with incorporating specific environmental, social and governance factors into the processes of our business units and corporate services.

The Donations and Sponsorships Committee recommends which nonprofit organizations will be the recipients of our charitable contributions, as stipulated in our policy in this regard.

#### SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT PRINCIPLES

Our main shareholder, CDPQ, is subject to the Quebec government's Sustainable Development Act and has signed on to the Principles for Responsible Investment (PRI). As a real estate subsidiary of CDPQ, we contribute to its sustainability action plan in keeping with the government's sustainable development strategy and to its PRI reporting activities.

## ENVIRONMENTAL DUE DILIGENCE

We perform environmental due diligence for all acquisitions, developments and operations in all regions. Our processes are underpinned by an environmental management system, which comprises various compliance control mechanisms, including 11 environmental programs. Environmental performance is tracked, and results are submitted to the Audit Committee on a yearly basis.

# Materiality assessment

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## Materiality assessment

We have opted to consult with our stakeholders every other year in order to be able to act on the adjustments they propose. For this report, CSR Management conducted a materiality assessment in 2018-2019.

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The objective of this assessment was to identify the factors perceived as the most important by our stakeholders, including those who work for the organization and our external partners. The CSR content of this report was driven by the findings of the materiality assessment, as required by the underlying GRI reporting principles. As of last year, the focus is larger than previous assessments and includes our full portfolio.

An initial electronic survey was conducted with all identified stakeholders to gauge the relative importance of each aspect. We also updated our list of stakeholders according to five criteria: responsibility, proximity, influence, dependency and impact.

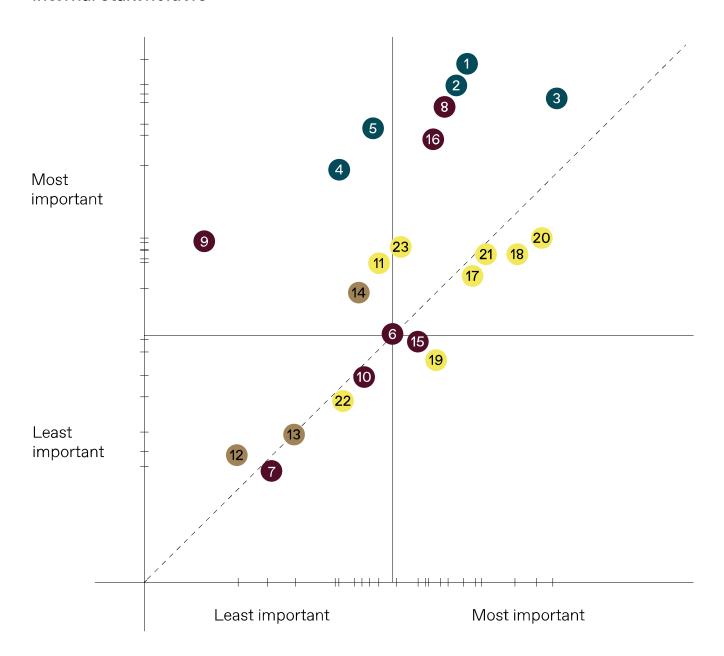
